

## Ethnicity in Ireland

## Group selection

The majority of the Irish population is Roman-Catholic and a minority of 3% is Anglican. However, neither of these groups is mobilized around their ethnicity politically. "Whereas at the beginning of the twentieth century southern Protestants were a national minority with their own ethnic symbols, myth of history and political program, today they are essentially a denominational minority, distinguished from the majority mainly in terms of religious practice and belief" (2631, 59). Further, in 1997, "surveys continued to convey the impression of Irish tolerance of ethnic [and religious] minorities" (ibid: 46). Irish Travellers are neither politically relevant (2632, 2633).
